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## "In an I Living Lab I learned the power of collective knowledge."

Everyone learns something different from an I Living Lab. For me, this was the power of collective knowledge and that the impact does not have to be immediately visible.

#### Collective knowledge

In an I Living Lab, you are never alone. You come together with students from different courses and countries to solve one of the wicked problems. Your team is composed in a way that there is always a good mix of skills & qualities. And then the power of collective knowledge naturally emerges. That cooperation in your team is really important, actively

listening, having an open mindset and merging your own point of view with that of your team members. Even with the Challengers (companies/entrepreneurs who provide the wicked problems), collaboration is essential and working purpose-driven toward the dot on the horizon.

#### The impact of an I Living Lab

The impact of an I Living Lab may not always be immediately visible. With me, that impact came later and also somewhat by accident. During the I Living Lab, I got to know several entrepreneurs. One of them had a company that makes scented candles from discarded frying oil. Coincidentally, I was working on my own start-up about

upcycled items for my graduation project. We kept in touch and ... long story short: I sold the candles in my webshop and pop-up store.

# "Be open to ideas from others and be flexible. That's how you will be successful."

I learned so much during the bootcamp: working efficiently under time pressure, new content, new stuctures and techniques that experts use in their workshops.

#### We started immediately

Before the bootcamp, we received the project options and some assigned reading materials. As a result, I felt reasonably comfortable going into the adventure. On the train from Vienna to the Austrian Alps, we met our teams and already did a first brainstorming session. The pace was immediately high but it also teaches you how to work efficiently. Fortunately, my team was very vocal and imaginative which allowed us to quickly discuss and

explore numerous ideas.

#### **Personal growth**

During the expert workshop, I gained valuable insights about building and structuring workshops. I teach workshops on circularity and sustainability myself, and the techniques I learned at the expert bootcamp I can now apply myself.

#### **Surprising characters**

Collaborating with international students from diverse educational backgrounds was an eye-opener and an added value to the whole experience. It encouraged us to think outside the box. A girl studying tourism in our group, for example, turned out to be the "IT brain" of our project and makes decisions faster than some

computer science students. This taught me the importance of flexibility in assigning roles at the beginning of a project, rather than restricting individuals based on their area of expertise. Such rigid classifications like "technical people do X" or "business students work on Y" can be extremely limiting.

#### My tips for participants

Tip 1: Be open to the ideas of others and be flexible. This is how you will be successful. Tip 2: Take time in the beginning to discuss what everyone's goal is. Some may prioritize making new friendships, while others may want to develop a small idea that can be scaled up later. Understanding different personal goals at the beginning will help you better align.

## "Trust yourself and try something new, just do it! That will get you further."

Being nervous when you leave on an unprecedented adventure is quite normal. I was quite nervous before departure. But once that suitcase was packed, I let it go and seized the opportunity with both hands.

#### There is no need to be nervous

You never do an I Living Lab alone. You start with your team and you end with your team. During the online onboarding phase, we got to know each other and discovered the challenge we would be working on. Then, when you go abroad that week, you already know each other and also know perfectly well what

to expect. Moreover, each team also has a coach to whom you can always turn for any problem. They even act as interpreters when students can't find the words in English. So there is no reason to be afraid to participate.

## Teamwork is a learning opportunity

Getting people, who have had a different education and come from different countries, to work together, that was my goal. In healthcare, you mainly work with people from healthcare. But here, as a nursing student, I was in a team with a lot of IT people. We needed them, of course, because we had to look for an IT solution for a local

community. That collaboration didn't go so smoothly at first. The IT people just wanted to get started as quickly as possible while the idea of 'Design Thinking' is to take the time to brainstorm and find the best solution. But everything worked out fine in the end. After all, you are there to learn.

"It was an adventurous year with quite a few meetings in different countries. My friends asked jealously, 'Can you go to Austria AND Romania again?' But hey, anyone can participate! I just let it happen, with the result that I learned a lot."

#### **Executive Student Board**

I had applied for the bootcamp but just missed out on one of the four spots. But apparently I somehow made a good impression because a little later I was contacted to come along to the Future Forum in Austria. A lot of people came together there to discuss the continuation of the E³UDRES² project. The ideas that emerged there were further explored at the 2nd get together in Romania. They organised the Int. Engagement Circus and I was also allowed to attend because I became part of the student board in the meantime. And in Romania the first Student Board meeting took place.

#### Clash of cultures

I really did experience that clash of cultures on that Student Board. It is enormously enriching to get to know different cultures but at the same time you have to understand those cultures and learn to deal with them. An example: during that first meeting, we voted on the structure of the board. Only the option of a classic hierarchical structure came up. Not many people were interested in my proposal for a broader top, except for my Dutch colleagues. Each country is on a different wavelength when it comes to communication, hierarchy, bringing in ideas. You have to take that into account, but you learn a lot from it.

#### Skills skills skills

So dealing with cultures is an important skill that you can only develop by participating in activities. Also dealing with "important people," you learn there. A few times I ended up in places where all the directors of the participating universities were present, together with the highest-ranking

directors of the E³UDRES² project itself. You notice then that those people are genuinely interested in what you have to say, that they pick up on it and build on your ideas. Everyone is equal there. And I found that very cool to experience. Furthermore, I think it is important to master the art of listening, to be eager to learn and to have a little ambition in life. And then just go for it and take the step.

#### Better late than never

I was sorry to discover E³UDRES² only at the end of my 2nd year (the project did not exist before that). It would benefit the sustainability of the Student Board if students could sit in it for 2 or 3 years instead of 1 year. That would provide more continuity. But I am extremely happy that I was able to do this. It was super interesting on all levels. And through those intercultural competencies, I also became a little more of a global citizen.

Working together with students from different programs and international students went smoothly for me, also because I am a social person. With one of the Latvian students it really clicked and we are still friends today.

#### A precious memory

I signed up for the hackathon because this was a very attractive opportunity to fill in my free space. Some fellow students and I wanted a fun and valuable reminder of our time in college. It seemed like something different from the other opportunities. Eventually the hackathon exceeded even my expectations. We formed a close E³UDRES² family with

everyone. Besides working on the assignments, the atmosphere was also great.

#### Listening will bring more

Our client (challenger) challenged us to develop a Start-Up Village. He was very involved in the concept and guided us well. When analyzing & implementing ideas, it is important utilize the many European backgrounds and diverse studies of all team members. I found it very interesting to see how differently people can look at the same topic. Sometimes it was challenging to get everyone to work together, but in the end we reached a good consensus and developed a great solution. I learned that it is crucial to listen to each other and to understand each other well

in order to reach a strong solution. It requires attention and respect for each other's opinions and viewpoints.

#### Tip for participants

Since the hackathon is very intense and short, it is advisable to study the assignment carefully beforehand and gather information in advance so that you do not waste time during the 36-hour hackathon.


## International Engagement Circus

## Hackathon

#### What is the hackathon?

Hackathons are short events that bring together international students, teachers and regional entrepreneurs for 36 hours. In small teams, you develop innovative solutions to a specific and complex problem. You don't do this alone. Teachers and experts assist you and each team is put together transdisciplinarily so that a lot of expertise comes together.

- 2 ECTS
- 3 hubs in Europe
- 60 students per hub
- 6 challenges


## I Living Lab - Online

#### **An I Living Lab? What?**

Within a I Living Lab you work together in a team of students, teachers and entrepreneurs with different (study) backgrounds and from various European countries. You determine the route as a team and you set your own individual learning goals. You contribute with your own expertise, talents and personality to the group. An I Living Lab uses the design-thinking methodology and lasts for 5 weeks. You and your team decide when you will meet online and work weekly together.

#### What students say


"Traveling abroad is not my thing. But with this online I Living Lab, I could still get an international experience. Ideal! The only thing to watch out for is making good arrangements that suit everyone. For example, in Latvia it is one hour later than in Belgium. If you meet in the evening until 9 p.m., it's already 10 p.m. for Latvians. But I thought it was a great experience getting to know all these nationalities and working together to solve our challenge."


